Chief Complaint/Clinical History: Hoshi was hit by a truck today just prior to presentation. The owner saw part of the accident. Hoshi ran into the street this morning and a truck hit him, he spun around and the owner found him dazed beneath the vehicle. He was previously healthy. No coughing, sneezing, vomiting or diarrhea. He was seen by Dr. Riggs for a bunny hop gait, but no abnormalities were found.

Physical Exam: BAR; wagging his tail on PE. T-101/3 P-130 R-26 MM-pink CRT < 2 sec. Wt/ 25# Ambulatory X4. Chest auscultates normally (heart and lungs auscult normally). No dyspnea. Neuro-WNL PLN-WNL INT- no abrasions or wounds. Orthopedic exam- No fractures or instability palpated. When he ran to the scale, he did have a "bunny" hopping gait; this was not reproducible.

Diagnostics: I-stat ECG-

Thoracic Radiographs- No evidence of pneumothorax or pulmonary contusions. 'The radiographs were unremarkable overall.

Abdominal Radiographs - Bladder small; the colon (containing air and feces) is overlapping the cranial edge, thus the bladder cannot be fully delineated. Abdominal detail good overall. No pelvic fractures or luxations seen

Treatment: Recommended hospitalization for overnight monitoring, and the owner agreed to this. Hoshi was kept overnight where he remained stable. His vitals were checked q. 6 hours and were unremarkable. He urinated in full every time he was walked. He ate and drank well and has not displayed any lameness. In the morning he was BAR

and continued to walk without lameness, Chest auscultation and abdominal palpation were unremarkable. He had normal hydration. He was discharged after 9 am.

Tentative Diagnosis: Stable Post Vehicular Trauma

Diet/Medications: Normal Diet

Tramadol 25 mg/ml: Give 1.5 ml by mouth every 8-12 hours for 5 days. Next dose due at 5 pm.

Recheck As Instructed Below: Please return directly to your veterinarian or OVRS if problems.

Additional Instructions: Hoshi has been hit by a truck but has escaped major injuries. Keep him quiet at home for the next few days as he still may be "sore" from the trauma. Leash walk him outside to eliminate only. No running, jumping or rough play for at least 1 week.

Make sure that Hoshi continues to eat and drink at home. Please monitor very closely for urination as bladder ruptures are possible from blunt trauma; though this is less likely. Please watch for difficulty urinating, small frequent urination and bloody urine. If he has any difficulty breathing, lethargy, anorexia, or any problems please return. Full bloodwork and repeat radiographs may be indicated if he has any problems.
